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The Zekelman Holocaust Center and the University of Michigan School of Music, Theatre & Dance to Host 'Music From Auschwitz: A Concert' on May 22

The free concert will feature 10 short musical pieces arranged by Polish political prisoners who were members of the men's orchestra in the Auschwitz I camp.

Farmington Hills, Mich., May 2, 2022 – The Zekelman Holocaust Center (The HC) and the University of Michigan School of Music, Theatre & Dance present *Music From Auschwitz: A Concert* on Sunday, May 22 at 2:00 p.m. The free performance, followed by refreshments will feature 10 short musical pieces arranged by Polish political prisoners who were members of the men's orchestra in the Auschwitz I camp.

A University of Michigan student orchestra led by conductor Oriol Sans will perform the original musical pieces interspersed with lines—spoken by the singers—from testimonies and interviews with members of the Auschwitz I men's orchestra after the war. Silent for more than 70 years, the voices and stirring melodies of those imprisoned at Auschwitz will be brought to life.

Using popular German hits of the 1930s and '40s, the prisoners arranged and orchestrated these tangos, waltzes and foxtrots for a dance band that played Sunday concerts for the Auschwitz garrison near the camp commandant's villa. The musical pieces were recently rediscovered in the archives of the Auschwitz-Birkenau State Museum in Poland.

Sans has inspired musicians and audiences across North America and Europe, including the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, the Ann Arbor Symphony Orchestra, the Michigan Chamber Winds and Strings, the Orquesta Filarmónica de Jalisco in Guadalajara (Mexico), the Flint Symphony Orchestra, the International Contemporary Ensemble and the Four Corners Ensemble. As Music Director of the Detroit Symphony Youth Orchestra—a position he has held since 2016—Sans has initiated collaborations with other musical institutions in the community, like the Young Artists Program at the Michigan Opera Theater.

“We are honored to welcome Conductor Sans to The Zekelman Holocaust Center to lead the University of Michigan student orchestra through these beautiful and moving musical pieces,” said Rabbi Eli Mayerfeld, CEO, The Zekelman Holocaust Center. “He has inspired and led many orchestras here in Michigan. His performance has such deep contemporary relevance. This will be an exceptional music event.”
