## Reflections and Candle Lighting

### Rabbi Marla Hornsten

Survivors of the Holocaust, their children, and their grandchildren come together with family, friends, veterans, and the greater community to light these memorial candles. We gather to remember and honor six million Jews who were murdered by the Nazis and their collaborators.

**We invite Rachel Growe to light the first candle.** She was born in Leordina, Romania. She echoes the message of many. “This should never happen again, and Israel should be safe.”

**We invite William Sperber to light the second candle.** He was born in Berehovo, Czechoslovakia. People often ask him how he survived. In response, he says, “I was only 13 when I went to the camp, but I never worried about getting killed. I was positive about surviving.”

**We invite Sheri Kohen to light the third candle.** She was born in Sevlus, Czechoslovakia. Most of her family was murdered, but she survived the Holocaust and imprisonment in Cyprus. “Today, I am proud to have many grandchildren and great-grandchildren.”

**We invite Henry Wormser to light the fourth candle.** He was born in Strasbourg, France. He hopes that what happened during the Holocaust never happens again. “It is important to learn history because antisemitism is still an issue today.”

**We invite Sofia Chayt to light the fifth candle.** She was born in Zlatoust, Soviet Union. “My father was an actor in Yiddish theater. We moved from Poland to Israel, then came to the US in the 1970s. Now, we are rebuilding our family.”

**We invite Ida Aisner to light the sixth candle.** She was born in Zlatoust, Soviet Union. She wants people to know that each Holocaust survivor’s story is unique. “I was born a proud Jew in Russia, and then I lost 100 family members in the Holocaust.”

**We invite John Rosen to light the seventh candle.** He was born in Buer, Germany. He wants others to know that during the Holocaust, there were people who went out of their way to save the lives of children and these actions cannot be forgotten.

**We invite Paula Marks-Bolton to light the eighth candle.** She was born in Ozorków, Poland. She never gave up hope in the camps, even during the most tragic times. “No matter what your troubles are, have hope that better times will come.”

**We invite Carl User to light the ninth candle.** He was born in Burdujeni, Romania. His family tried to stay in Romania after the war but suffered from antisemitism. “We made a fresh start in America and lived good lives here.”

**We invite Isac User to light the tenth candle.** He was born in Burdujeni, Romania. He wants others to know that he worked day and night to support his family in America. “I was dedicated to raising a family with a better future.”

**We invite Jeannette Olson to light the eleventh candle.** She was born in Nice, France. A childless couple took her in under the guise that she was their niece. Jeannette’s father was a custom tailor, a skill that helped secure a hiding place for her parents in the attic of his employer’s home. “We survived. By sheer luck, we had been in the right place at the right time.”

**We invite Katherine Sattler to light the twelfth candle.** She was born in Uzhorod, Czechoslovakia. Her job in the camps was to find jewels and money in the clothes of those murdered. “I hated giving my father’s coat to the soldiers watching. But I promised that I would keep my mother and sister alive, and I did.” After liberation, she also found her brother.

**Let us pledge:** Zachor, to always remember. As a united community, may we all commit to commemorating the past and working towards a more humane world. Together, let us honor the memory of all those who tragically perished in the Shoah. And let us say Amen.

### The Little Smuggler

Written by Henryka Łazowertówna in the Warsaw Ghetto

Henryka continued to write while imprisoned in the ghetto to document daily life for the Ringelblum Archive. She also cared for homeless and orphaned children who she refused to leave behind. In 1942, Henryka declined an opportunity to save herself from transport and accompanied her mother to Treblinka, where they both perished in the gas chambers.

Rachel was a young writer who survived the Warsaw Ghetto and helped compile, bury, and recover the Ringelblum Archive of Jewish life in the ghetto. After emigrating to Israel in 1950, she trained generations of archivists and researchers at Yad Vashem. Yizkor was written to inform Poles of the fate of Poland's Jews and is one of few pieces translated into English.
